Keynote Speaker Tamara Lorincz

Why Peace is the Most Important Climate Solution

Tamara is a long-time environmental and peace activist and academic in Canada. She is currently a PhD candidate in Global Governance at the Balsillie School for International Affairs at Wilfrid Laurier University in Canada.

She was awarded the Rotary International World Peace Fellowship and was a senior researcher for the International Peace Bureau in Switzerland. Tamara is a member of the Canadian Voice of Women for Peace and the Women's International League for Peace and Freedom. She is currently on the international board of Global Network Against Nuclear Power and Weapons in Space and the No to War, No to NATO Network.

Her research interests are the military's impacts on the environment and climate change. Tamara wrote the IPB report "Demilitarization for Deep Decarbonization", the WILPF-Canada report "Soaring: The Harms and Risks of Fighter Jets and Why Canada Must Not Buy a New Fleet" and the UN Submission "The Militarization of Indigenous Land in Canada." She has been to the past climate summits raising awareness about the need for peace for climate justice and cutting military spending for climate finance.

Keynote Speaker Dominique Palmer

Dominique Palmer is a Climate Justice Activist, writer, and graduate of Political Science and International Relations in the U.K. She is part of Climate Live, and a founding member of, and on the Steering Committee for the Youth Climate Justice Fund.

Her work focuses on intersectional and equitable climate action, making environmentalism inclusive, slow fashion, harnessing creative means to communicate the climate crisis, and finding joy through uniting. She started her activism as part of 'Fridays for Future' and was involved in organising the 2019 September climate strikes which mobilised 300,000 people onto the streets in the U.K.

Palmer is a winner of the prestigious Planetary Health Award, and in 2023, was honoured as a 'Young Leader' at the Green Carpet Fashion Awards. She was also named in Forbes 2020 Top U.K Environmentalists List for her work.

She was named one of the U.K's most high profile youth activists on Sky News, and has featured in major publications including British Vogue, DAZED, the Sunday Times Style, and Global Citizen. In 2024, she was named on the Future Figures list by BBC 1xtra.

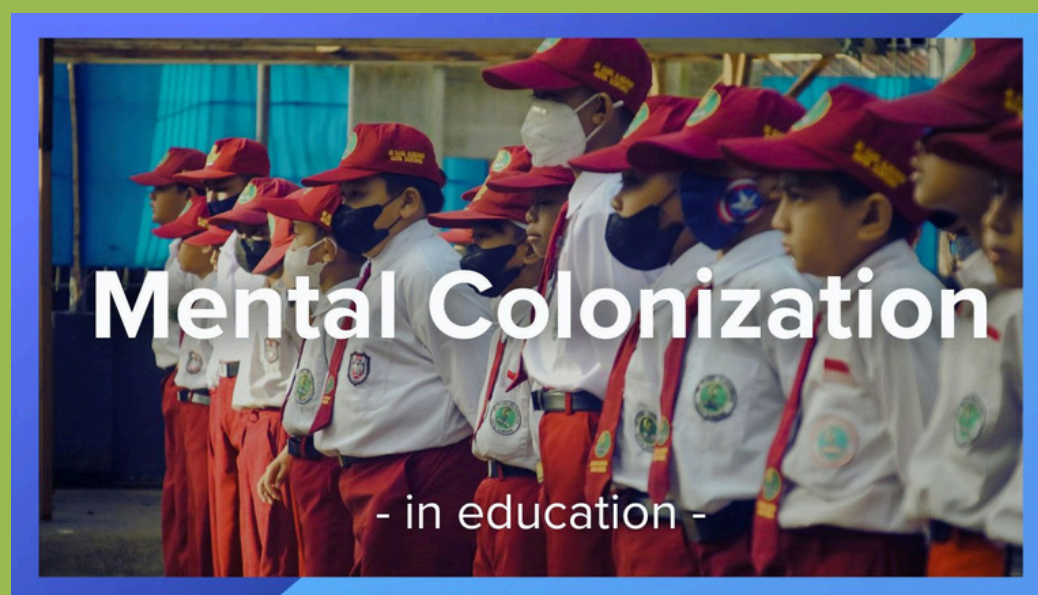
How our childhood and youth is being stolen by Silicon Valley

This workshop will be about something that affects nearly every child, every teenager and every family which comes from the powerful, and often invisible grip Silicon Valley has on our youngest generation. In just over a decade, smartphones and social media have reshaped what it means to grow up. Playgrounds have been replaced by platforms. Conversations replaced by clicks. Children now spend more time online than in the real world. And behind every swipe and scroll there is a billion-dollar industry engineered to capture attention, and shaping behavior therefore keeping young users permanently hooked. We currently see a rise in levels of anxiety, loneliness, depression and self-harm, and this is not a coincidence. This workshop will explore how Big Tech designs structures that are directly affecting the brains of children at large. Let us also talk about solutions and what it is we can do.

In this experiential workshop, participants will engage in
discussion, guided meditation, creative writing, and deep

Challenging the West: BRICS



In this workshop, I will give a brief introduction about BRICS, which is an intergovernmental organizations consisting of Brazil, Russia, India, China and South Africa that have an aim to promote peace, security, development and cooperation through economic collaboration.

From a Western perspective, BRICS is seen to be a rival to the current countries in power (G7) and a threat to US America's wish for global order. This might be the reason why we know so little about this relatively new collaboration.

As educators, we should be aware of and curious of what is happening beyond the Western narrative media coverage to understand what is happening in our countries, in Europe and the World at large – to get a better understanding of what direction we need to go in, to secure a more peaceful and better world.

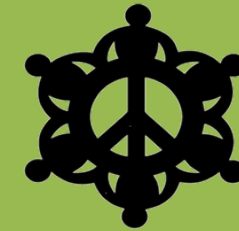
